

She was awarded a Data Science Initiative Scholarship for her project titled "A Bayesian Approach for Dimensionality Assessment in Network Psychometrics." This project is working to develop a network modeling technique in Bayesian methodology to study relations between variables and assess dimensionality in multivariate psychological data.

Congratulations to Professor Adrienne Carter-Sowell! She was recently featured in the Dodge Family College of Arts and Sciences Newsletter for her work leading a working group on COVID-19. She is leading this group for the Association for Psychological Science Global Collaboration. The collaboration convenes psychological scientists and other behavioral science experts to assess how the field has contributed to combating the COVID-19 pandemic and identifying gaps in understanding that should be addressed through new research. Professor Carter-Sowell and her workgroup will convene a pre-conference workshop at the APS Annual Convention in Chicago. She is also leading a special invited research symposium at the conference titled "COVID-19 and the Workplace: Interdisciplinary Insights on the Shecession, Essential Workers and the New Normal."

Congratulations to Professor Eric Day! He was awarded a Data Science Initiative Scholarship for his project titled "Piloting the Viability of EEG Measurement toward a Dynamic Theory of Self-Regulation in the Acquisition, Retention, and Adaptive Transfer of Complex Performance."

This project is a new interdisciplinary effort between the doctoral programs in Industrial/ Organizational Psychology and Cellular/ Behavioral Neurobiology integrating psychological theory on self-regulated learning and workplace training with a cognitive-neuroscience perspective to human attention and performance.





