Says Luke, "Receiving the scholarship for my research meant a lot to me; it validated all the hard work and effort I put into my research and my presentation."

Savannah Collins, a junior recipient of the Savoie Lottinville award, is completing her political science degree this year and pursuing minors in Russian Language and International Security Studies. She works at the Center for Applied Social Research as a research assistant, focusing on nuclear energy and nuclear siting. Savannah also works at the Carl Albert Center for Congressional Studies as a student archivist and a research assistant to Dr. Cindy Simon Rosenthal. Savannah states, "To have my work recognized by such a prominent group is deeply rewarding."

Ganga Moorthy, a junior recipient of the Amy Taylor Sewell Memorial scholarship, is an OU senior, applying to medical school at Mayo, Georgetown, and the OUHSC. Ganga is also applying to volunteer abroad in Europe or India through scholarships including the Rhodes, Marshall, Luce, or Gates.

Annual Author's Evening features Phi Beta Kappa Scholar Dr. David Levy

The Phi Beta Kappa Association of Oklahoma City cordially invites you to the Annual Author's Evening at Full Circle Bookstore, Fifty Penn Place on North Pennsylvania at Northwest Expressway, in Oklahoma City.

**Tuesday, November 1, 2011
7:00 – 8:30 p.m.**

The event will feature Phi Beta Kappa scholar and University of Oklahoma Professor Emeritus of American History, Dr. David Levy. Dr. Levy will speak about his most recent book, *Mark Twain: The Divided Mind of America's Best-Loved Writer*.

The life and writings of a beloved American writer illuminate the Gilded Age and reveal his ambivalence toward the changes wrought by industry and wealth. Like the steamboat on which Mark Twain adopted his pen name, the industrial growth that swept America in the latter half of the nineteenth century prompted Americans to react variously with delight, awe, fear, excitement for the future, and nostalgia for a simpler time. David Levy's biography places Mark Twain and his work in the context of sweeping societal changes: westward expansion, the Civil War, American imperialism, the end of slavery and start of a new chapter in race relations, and the advances and excesses of the Gilded Age.

Light snacks and a cheese tasting will be provided by Forward Foods, central Oklahoma's best-known specialty and import food store! Attire is "casual fireside," and bringing guests is encouraged! Cost is \$10 per person, or \$50 per patron (of which \$40 is a tax-deductible donation to the scholarship fund).



2011 PBK Scholarship Winner Report

Endowed Scholarship Recipients

The Alpha of Oklahoma Chapter competitively awards a number of endowed scholarships each year, and is pleased to announce this year's scholarship and award recipients.

Savoie Lottinville was a longtime member of the chapter, a 1929 Rhodes Scholar, and editor of the OU Press. Two Lottinville awards were given to Whitney Minor, a microbiology major from Chino Hills, CA (\$500), and Savannah Collins, a political science major from Norman (\$200).

The Amy Taylor Sewell memorial scholarship is awarded to students in the College of Arts and Sciences who have demonstrated through broad cultural interests and scholarly achievements the intellectual, aesthetic, ethical, and social qualities present in liberally educated persons. Two Sewell scholarships were awarded to Ganga Moorthy, a microbiology/pre-med major from Alva (\$1000), and Bailie Gregory, a political science major from Bixby (\$750).

In order to demonstrate the chapter's commitment to high quality original research by undergraduate students, the

chapter gives two prizes to those in our College whose research papers were judged to be the best at the annual Undergraduate Research Day. Two Undergraduate Research Awards were given in the name of Roland Lehr. The winners were chosen by thorough ranking by a committee of attending faculty members. The first Lehr award (\$300) went to Luke Engelmann, a senior zoology-biomedical sciences major from Weatherford, OK, for his paper on nicotine metabolites. The second Lehr prize (\$200) was awarded to Joshua Malone, a biochemistry major from Oklahoma City, for his paper on crystallographic research.



Junior Scholarships

Phi Beta Kappa junior scholarships are open to all juniors with at least a 3.7 GPA. All students will receive an invitation to apply via OU email in early spring. The committee will review applications and select winners, regardless of the applicant's potential membership in Phi Beta Kappa.

Visiting Scholar Report

The Spring 2011 Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar (April 6-8, 2011) was Dr. Michael McCormick, Francis Goelet Professor of Medieval History at Harvard, and author of *Origins of the European Economy* and *Charlemagne's Survey of the Holy Land*. Dr. McCormick is currently working on natural scientific approaches to the past, including the history of human health and the environment, he co-directs the exploration of a Carolingian royal estate recently identified in Flanders, Belgium, and of the ongoing excavation of a fortified late Roman township in eastern France.

The topic of his lecture, co-sponsored by the Department of History and the Department of Classics, was given at the Sam Noble Museum of Natural History on April 7, 2011. His topic was "Climate Change and the Fall of the Roman Empire." Approximately 200 enthusiastic attendees came to his feature event.

Regrettably, due to Phi Beta Kappa budget cuts, the University of Oklahoma does not anticipate hosting a Visiting Scholar in the 2011-2012 academic year.
